If you have a situation you'd like an officer to check on then you can call the Dispatch non-emergency number 701.451.7660. If ever in doubt, call 911! You can also choose to remain anonymous, so don't let that deter you from calling. It takes all of us to keep our community safe!

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### **Moorhead Police Department's Citizens Police Academy**

The Moorhead Police Department will be offering a Citizens Police Academy this fall. This program meets Thursday evenings from 6-9 pm, for 10 weeks beginning September 15 and ending November 17. 

#### Cadet Program Update: One Year Later Proving to be a Success!

A year ago, in this newsletter, I introduced this new initiative implemented to improve diversity in the department and assist with recruiting new officers. To be eligible to apply to the Cadet Program applicants need to be currently enrolled in a law enforcement or criminal justice program and willing to commit, on a part-time basis, to at least six months with our department.

Moorhead Cadets respond to non-emergency calls for service that include: parking enforcement, animal concerns, found property, minor theft reports, vehicle unlocks, and traffic control at parades, marathons and other events.

MPD received eleven applicants of which four were selected to be in the initial Cadet class. The students chosen were Suham Ali, MSUM; Alli Garding, NDSU; Sam Mukanya Mukengeshayi, MState; and Nathan Wambach, MState. These Cadets did an excellent job and we guickly

### **MPD to Implement Body-Worn Cameras**

The Moorhead Police Department is currently in the process of selecting body-worn cameras (BWCs). The Moorhead Police Department's primary focus for obtaining BWCs was based on proven facts that they improve officer safety, increase evidence quality, reduce civilian complaints, and reduce agency liability. The Moorhead City Council has pledged support and financial resources to move forward with the BWC project. Our goal would be to have them ordered and possibly implemented by the end of the year.

First, with the City of Moorhead Information Technology (IT) Department's collaboration, which will oversee the technology, data retention and collection, and necessary redaction of captured footage, several hours of planning and communication have been invested in developing the list of product features that would be the best fit for both departments. Some key features include image point of view, pre-event capture, comfort and size, mounting options, durability and reliability, ease of use, data management, and resistance to weather conditions. The selection reduced our choices to three vendors.

We are currently in the process of testing the three products in the field. Currently, four officers are wear testing the devices. The testing provides "real-life" footage to compare and allows our IT Department a chance to analyze each product's back-end data management systems. We can also see the difference in capturing day and night video and audio quality.

Finally, the BWCs will be narrowed to two products. The financial costs, product quality, and available features will be compared. Once we order the devices, we will depend on availability and production times. Our IT Department will prepare the pre-arrival technical support and begin training during that time. There will also be a time for public input before deploying the devices. The policy regarding our BWC system is available to be viewed by visiting our website or contacting our department for a copy.

Once implemented, the BWCs will be worn by uniformed Patrol Officers and their Supervisors, Community Service Officers and Cadets during their shifts, Investigators during specific operations, and Administration during particular duties. An inventory of spares will also be available if a BWC requires repair and is out of service. The goal would be to have the product delivered and training completed for the BWCs to be utilized for duty by the end of 2022 or early 2023.

Shown below is one of the cameras being tested. The picture quality of body worn cameras have come a long way over the years. The clarity is impressive, especially in the dark.









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### **Crime Alert: Bicycle Thefts**

Tis the season for bike thefts. Do your part to protect your bike and prevent becoming a victim. In addition, document your bike's serial number, detailed description, distinguishing marks, and take a picture. Find a "Bicycle Information Checklist" as well as safety information, helmet, and riding tips at <a href="https://www.moorheadpolice.com">www.moorheadpolice.com</a> (type "bicycle safety" in the search box).

#### To prevent theft:

- Keep your bike in a locked garage or locked shed when not using it, day and night.
- Lock up your bike in well lit areas, preferably with video surveillance.
- Using a "U-lock" (pictured) is best as cable locks can easily be cut through.
- Use more than one lock for added security.
- Lock your wheel and frame together.
- Secure your bike to a bike rack versus a sign pole.
- Take lights and other easily removed items with you.
- Add distinguishing marks to your bike/engrave name and phone number

Following approval of the Moorhead River Corridor Plan by the Mayor and City Council in 2014, work began to implement the goals established by the community which included *Connectivity* along the River Corridor.

The paved River Corridor Trail currently runs from Original Homestead Park to Woodlawn Park and Gooseberry Mound Park to Bluestem Center for the Arts. The Midtown Trail, which will connect Woodlawn and Gooseberry Parks, is anticipated to be complete by summer of 2023. Midtown Trail is a combination of off road and on road trail segments that will connect to the existing River Corridor Trail. The construction of the River Corridor Trail was made possible by grants received from Greater MN Regional Parks and Trail Commission for the Legacy Grant Award and Transportation Alternative Program Grant.



While on the Trail, check out Moorhead's newest public art installation at Davy-Memorial Park – a bevy of larger-than-life sculpted beavers created by local artists Catie Miller and Emily Williams-Wheeler.
